

Aman, Estrella Monterrey (Short, Canary Islands, 2016, 10 min)

An imagined portrait of the ancient indigenous people of the Canary Islands, an autonomous community of Spain off the East African coast. Using the extinct language Guanche, Aman raises awareness about the necessity to protect, preserve, and promote cultural heritage of the original inhabitants of the islands through filmmaking.

They Were Promised the Sea, Katy Wazana (Feature, Canada, 2012, 72 min)

An intimate road movie shot in Morocco, Israel-Palestine, and New York that follows filmmaker Kathy Wazana as she seeks to understand the mass emigration of Moroccan Jews from Morocco in the 1960s and her own family history. Unleashed is a com-plex web of questions about dual identity, political opportunism, and the challenges faced by those torn between homeland and promised land.

Amazigh Misr, Ahram Canadian University in Egypt (Documentary, Egypt-Canada, 2016, 15 mn) Produced by Egyptian college students for the Festival, this documentary presents the rich history, culture, and language of the Amazigh people of Siwa, an oasis in Egypt's Western Desert.

Addour, Ahmed Baidou (Feature, Morocco, 2016, 85 min)

Inspired by a true story, this drama portrays the historical resistance of Amazigh people in southern Morocco against French colonialism. We learn of Zaid Ouhmad, a hero whose visage has become an iconic symbol of the struggle for national independence.

King Rebel Proconsul, Mohamed Megdoul (Short, France-Algeria, 2015, 20 min)

17 AD, Takfarinas, a Numidian deserter from the Roman army, raise an army of berber tribes and lead them to war against the Roman occupation of North Africa.

Sin Eh, Asem Gharsaa (Short, Libya, 31 mn)

Two brothers immigrating from their home town, Jadu in Nafusa Mountain to Tripoli in 1960s and 1970s as a result of government's excessive policy.

Tomast N Teniri, Solimane Salem Khalifa Hman (Documentary, Libya, 2015, 15 mn) A journey into the lives, cultures, and political attitudes of the Amazigh people of the desert in postrevolutionary Libya who were denied expression of their identity and heritage. **Q&A Zakia Salime (Yale University) and Faical Gouaghou (Lecturer)**

Tribute to the Canary Islands Amazigh Film

Mah, Armando Ravelo (short, Canary Island, 2016, 26 min)

Set in the Canary Islands before the European conquest, Maho tells the story of an indigenous mother who is about to face the greatest test of her life.

Canarias Amazigh, Antonio Bonny & Pablo Rodríguez (Documentary, Canary Islands, 2017, 65 min) The most up-to-date approach to the population of the Canaries in pre-Hispanic times. Archaeology shows that the African con-tinent substratum has not completely vanished.


